He was a representative from the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC), a new government agency designed to help young, unemployed men. The CCC just opened its first camp in a nearby town called Luray, and they are recruiting local men between the ages of 18 and 25. The man from the CCC said that you can come work at the camp once you turn 18.

He said there would be three meals a day, and you would get paid \$30 a month. However, reserve officers from the Army are in charge of the camp, so the rules are quite strict. This changes everything! You were all set to embark on a great adventure and now you have to make a choice. Will you try to meet your brother in Charleston? Or will you go the CCC camp, where the rules are strict, but the food and pay are guaranteed?
